Trustees Annual Report for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year ended 31 August 2021. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report incorporating a strategic report, and a directors' report under company law.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Academy is a company limited by guarantee with no share capital (registration no. 08018146) and is also an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Academy.

The governors act as trustees for the charitable activities of Yarborough Academy and are also the directors for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as Yarborough Academy.

Details of the governors who served during the year are included in the Reference and Administrative details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they cease to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

The Academy through its Articles has indemnified the Governors to the fullest extent permissible by law. During the period the Academy also purchased liability insurance for the Governors. In August 2015 the Academy joined the RPA scheme which includes £unlimited cover for each governor.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

The Members may appoint up to 8 Governors.

The Members may appoint Staff Governors (who are elected by members of staff) provided that the total number of Governors (including the Head Teacher) who are employees of the Academy Trust does not exceed one third of the total number of Governors.

The Head Teacher shall be treated for all purposes as being an ex officio Governor.

Parent Governors shall be elected by parents of registered pupils at the Academy. A Parent Governor must be a parent of a pupil at the Academy at the time when he/she is elected.

The Governors may appoint up to 3 Co-opted Governors.

Additional governors may be appointed by the Secretary of State for Education under the terms outlined in the Articles of Association.

The Full Board of Governors have meetings 3 times per year, with the Finance & Risk committee, which comprises most of the current governor cohort, also meeting in between those dates. In addition there is also a separate Pay and Appraisal Committee which meets once a year to discuss Performance Management. The Full Governing Body receive reports from all the sub-committees. Over the course of the last 12 months these meetings have been conducted virtually via Zoom due to the Covid pandemic. These meetings are supplemented by additional regular Governor visits and reports which together ensure that all aspects of Finance, Teaching and Learning, together with Safeguarding remain under constant and detailed focus.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

The training and induction provided for new governors will depend on their existing experience. All governors are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as governors. The Head has created an induction policy for new Governors at the academy, to ensure they have the knowledge to fulfil their role. This is supplemented by further ongoing training provided either in house or via the local council.

Organisational structure

The aim of the management structure is to increase achievement for all children and build capacity throughout the Academy.

The Governors are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring and challenging the leadership of the Academy, through the use of budget and making decisions about the strategic direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and staffing.

The Headteacher controls the Academy at an executive level, implementing the policies as agreed with the Governors and reporting back on their impact. The Headteacher is responsible for the authorisation of spending within agreed limits and the appointment of staff, in consultation with the Resources Committee.

The Senior Leadership Team (SLT) consists of the Headteacher, Deputy Head, SENCO, the Lead teacher for English, Lead teacher for Maths, Assessment Leader, EYFS Leader, Behavioural Health Lead and School Business Manager.

The SLT is responsible for the day to day operation of the Academy.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The Academy has had no problem attracting members to the SLT and has used the Performance Management cycle to set pay for its Senior Leadership Team. The trustees have all acted as volunteers. No remuneration has been received by trustees except as disclosed at note 9.

Risk management

The governors have assessed the major risks to which the Academy is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific teaching, provision of facilities and other operational areas of the Academy, and its finances. The governors have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (e.g. in relation to teaching, health and safety) and in relation to the control of finance.

They have introduced systems, including operational procedures (e.g. vetting of new staff and visitors, supervision of school grounds) and internal financial controls in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover. The Academy has an effective system of internal financial controls.

Connected organisations, including related party relationships

There were no related party transactions or significant connections to organisations for the year ended 31 August 2021.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The principal object and activity is the operation of Yarborough Academy to provide education within a school for pupils of different abilities between the ages of 3 and 11.

Objectives, strategies and activities

In accordance with the articles of association the Academy has adopted a Funding Agreement and Articles of Association approved by the Secretary of State for Education. The Funding Agreement specifies, amongst other things, the basis for admitting students to the Academy, the catchment area from which the students are drawn and that the curriculum should be broad and balanced.

The main objectives of the Academy during the period ended 31 August 2021 are summarised below:

- to improve achievement for all pupils across the Academy;
- to improve the effectiveness of the Academy by keeping the curriculum and organisational structure under continual review;
- to provide value for money for the funds expended;
- · to comply with all appropriate statutory and curriculum requirements;
- to conduct the Academy's business in accordance with the highest standards of integrity, probity and openness.
- to provide a nurturing and caring environment for all pupils and staff that is trauma aware.

At Yarborough Academy, pupils and staff benefit from a unique, project-based curriculum that provides learning and teaching that is at least good and an increasing proportion of which is outstanding.

Achievement is improving rapidly in all areas of the Academy because of our curriculum organisation including project based learning along with the associated depth of learning and accompanying assessment and feedback. All of this is deepening understanding, increasing engagement and addressing areas of previously identified underperformance.

This is evidenced through a series of robust self- evaluations consisting of observations of project based learning, core skills, planning, use of assessments and work in books. Further improvements are outlined in the Academy Development Plan and individual action plans from Senior Leaders. External quality assurance provided by Ofsted in March 2018 and Challenge Partners in February 2019 confirmed this judgement. Input from Challenge Partners will recommence as Covid guidelines allow.

The Academy's main strategies to achieve the objectives are encompassed in the four main priorities taken from the agreed improvement plan:

- To enable all children to catch up post lock down through a bespoke and inspiring curriculum.
- To ensure the school is COVID-19 secure.
- To continue to embed a trauma and neuroscience informed culture.

Public benefit

The above activities are undertaken for public benefit and the Academy's governors have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers or duties.

Strategic Report

Achievements and performance

The Academy is in its ninth year of operation. Total students in the period ended 31 August 2021 numbered 440 (2019/20: 438).

Key non-financial performance indicators

Achievement for the Academy as against national figures is summarised below:

Due to COVID-19 and lockdown, children did not undertake any statutory assessments as per direction from the government. The staff team worked hard to ensure that the high standards of curriculum, learning, feedback and pastoral support were maintained over lockdown via the use of online learning (Zoom and Google Classroom). When children were back in school, a full programme of catch up was implemented following the identification in gaps in children's learning.

Children in this school make very good progress in Key Stage Two from their various starting points. The overall effectiveness of Yarborough Academy is evaluated by the Headteacher as Good with Outstanding features. If is judged as Good from Ofsted and Outstanding from Challenge Partners.

This is because pupils benefit from learning and teaching, of which an increasing proportion is outstanding. Achievement is improving rapidly in all areas of the Academy because of our unique curriculum offer, including Project Based Learning, the associated depth of learning and accompanying assessment and feedback.

Areas of identified subject underperformance (for example Mathematics) have been addressed and the impact is clear in data and in children's work.

Historically, in statutory assessments, Yarborough pupils achieve above National expectations in the Early Learning Goals, Year 1 phonics check, Key Stage 1 attainment in Reading and Mathematics, Key Stage 2 attainment in Mathematics and Reading and progress measures for Reading, Writing and Mathematics.

This is further evidenced through a series of robust self-evaluations consisting of observations of project based learning, core skills, planning, use of assessments and work completed in books and recorded electronically. Further improvements are outlined in the Academy Improvement Plan and individual action plans from Senior Leaders. External quality assurance is provided by Challenge Partners in February 2019 and Ofsted in March 2018 to confirm our judgement.

Safeguarding has been externally validated as Outstanding.

The Academy has robust financial procedures and auditing to allow efficient use of the budget.

Those children who have fallen behind in key areas are identified early through formative and summative assessment. Support is delivered to ensure rapid improvement. The impact of this is monitored rigorously by the Headteacher, the SLT and Governors at pupil progress meetings, through class provision mapping and reports on standards to committee meetings and the full Governing Body.

Robust action has taken place to address areas of underperformance. The impact can be seen in the rapid improvement to achievement across the Academy in all key areas, as indicated by statutory outcomes.

Very effective action is taken to ensure that an increasing number of all pupils reach and exceed the expected standards. Data is evaluated, reported to class teachers, SLT and Governors. The impact of this action is shown in internal tracking, moderation and termly summative testing. This ensures external data and National expectations are known and achievable. These expectations also underpin performance management of teachers and the Headteacher.

There is a clear effort at Yarborough Academy to create a learning community that is positive, celebrates achievement and embeds a love of deep learning. The spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of pupils is effectively promoted through our behaviour and relationship system, morning meetings and weekly themes.

Strategic Report

It is thoughtfully and creatively developed via our project based curriculum encompassing the children's interests and motivations. These address the well-being of our pupils on a daily basis.

Additional support is available through the intervention work of the Learning Mentor. Well-being and mental health of children and parents are also supported in house through the employment of a Behavioural Health Lead who provides therapeutic intervention for staff, pupils and families as well as strategic level work, and externally, for example in offering Reflexology sessions to parents, children and staff.

Going concern

The governing body has a reasonable expectation that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for at least 12 months from the date of the report. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Financial review

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the DfE in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE during the period ended 31 August 2021 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

During the period ended 31 August 2021, total expenditure of £2,341,606 was more than covered by recurrent grant funding from the DfE together with other incoming resources and brought forward reserves balances. The reserves (excluding Restricted Fixed Asset Fund and Pension Reserve) carried forward into the new academic year is £533,884, made up of £331,883 in restricted funds, £202,001 in unrestricted funds.

Included within the restricted fixed asset fund of £4,478,182 is the net book value of fixed assets of £4,476,646 which can only be realised by disposing of assets. Movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 11 to the financial statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the Academy. The Actuary has calculated the pension scheme deficit as £2,038,000 as at 31 August 2021, which is an increase in deficit of £652,000. Further detail is provided in note 24 of this set of accounts.

The in year surplus on restricted general funds and unrestricted funds was £164,503.

Financial and risk management objectives and policies

Reserves policy

The Academy continues to have a healthy carry forward figure although this has steadily decreased in recent years due to a significant capital contribution to much needed premises refurbishment. The Full Governing Body consider the current Reserves Policy adequate to protect the Academy's ongoing activities. It is anticipated that the carry forward for this last year will be spent on increased teacher costs, an ongoing investment in new equipment, refinements to the PBL style of learning including a refreshed curriculum offer and the further embedding of the Behavioural Health practice adopted at the core of the Academy's ethos.

The academy currently holds £533,884 which is more than the agreed reserves policy of £250,000. As mentioned above areas have already been identified to utilise the additional carry forward.

Investment policy

The academy aims to manage its cash balances to provide for the day to day working capital requirements of its operations, whilst minimising the risk to the loss of these cash funds.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Academy has an effective system of internal financial controls. The Members and Governors have reviewed current examples of best practice and have set policies on internal controls which cover the following:

- the type of risks the Academy faces;
- the level of risks which they regard as acceptable;
- the likelihood of the risks materialising;
- the Academy's ability to reduce the incidence and impact on the Academy's operations of risks that do materialise;
- the costs of operating particular controls relative to the benefits obtained.
- · clarified the responsibility of the Senior Leadership Team to implement the Governors' policies and to identify and evaluate risks for the Governors' consideration;
- · explained to employees that they have responsibility for internal control as part of their accountability for achieving objectives;
- embedded the control system in the Academy's operations so that it becomes part of the culture of the Academy;
- · developed systems to respond quickly to evolving risks arising from factors within the Academy and to changes in the external environment; and
- included procedures for reporting failings immediately to appropriate levels of management and the Governors together with details of corrective action being undertaken.

Fundraising

The Academy conducted very little fundraising during the 12 months due to the consideration of family's financial struggles during the pandemic as well as restrictions in school meaning whole school events could not take place. Some year groups raised money for charities as part of their projects in the summer term. These included The RNLl, local food bank, local COVID ward.

Plans for future periods

The Academy will build on its Ofsted judgement by continuing the proportion of outstanding teaching and to improve achievement in Greater Depth Writing to match that of Reading and Mathematics. The Project Based Learning curriculum will continue to be embedded, with an assessment system that ensures all children are achieving age related expectations. The Academy will also continue its great work towards becoming Trauma Informed. The Academy will review its status as an independent Academy and make decisions regarding the future governance and leadership direction in the academic year ahead.

Governance Statement

Scope of responsibility

As governors, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Yarborough Academy has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

As trustees, we have reviewed and taken account of the guidance in DfE's Governance Handbook and competency framework for governance.

The governing body has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Head Teacher, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between Yarborough Academy and the Secretary of State for Education. The Head Teacher is also responsible for reporting to the governing body any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

Governance reviews

The academy completes a skills audit of its governors. This includes the use of a self-assessment tool taken from the most current National Governors Association skills audit provision.

The areas covered by the review include:

- · current skills and commitment
- understanding and experience of governance
- · vision and strategic planning
- accountability and challenge
- · financial oversight
- · knowledge of school and community
- in-year contribution of individual governors
- · governor training

The Board continues to use the latest skills audit to inform and shape its ongoing Governor recruitment activities. The Board has a desire to increase its current number, in order to better spread the workload, however it remains a challenge to recruit willing and able volunteers.

Governance Statement (continued)

Effective oversight of funds

Although there were fewer than six board meetings held in the year, effective oversight of funds was maintained by financial information being sent regularly to trustees electronically.

Monthly management accounts information has been provided to all trustees who are then given the opportunity to raise any queries.

Financial reports are distributed to all of the trustees during the year with the Chair of Trustees receiving financial reports monthly. In order to keep trustees up to date with development and events, further communications are made by email and telephone and trustees make regular visits to the academy

Review of value for money

As accounting officer the governor and trustee has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year and reports to the board of governors where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- renewing the energy contracts using the LA's energy scheme, so that bulk savings can be achieved by joining with other schools.
- providing Governors with detailed financial reports so they can make informed decisions about the budget.
- highlighting specific areas of the premises for improvement to enhance the learning environment and provision of behavioural support.

During the COVID 19 pandemic the academy has supported suppliers in the following ways:

- Continuing to pay service costs to the provider of school meals and working with supermarkets such as Aldi and Morrisons to provide free school meals boxes.
- Enabling some services for pupils to continue remotely either by telephone or on-line. The provision of loaned ipads to households without sufficient IT availability extended the reach of these services and use of the Government support packages to purchase laptops to allow our teaching support team to provide a remote service for pupils.
- Continuing to pay as normal where services agreements were already in place but the level of service was reduced.
- Continuing to engage local contractors for premises work in relation to scheduled maintenance, repairs and enhancements.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness.

The system of internal control is based on an ongoing process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically.

The system of internal control has been in place in Yarborough Academy for the year ended 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of governors has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks.

The board of governors is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the year ended 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of governors.

The risk and control framework

The Academy's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- Comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Governing Body;
- Regular reviews by the Governing Body of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- Setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- Clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · Identification and management of risks.

The trustees have appointed new internal scrutineers, Duncan & Toplis, in addition to the statutory audit undertaken by Forrester Boyd, in order to comply with changes in ethical standards.

The reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial systems. In particular the checks carried out in the current period included:

- · Income
- · Payroll
- · Information Technology
- Governance
- · Strategic and operational
- · Budgets and financial monitoring
- · Compliance

This is in addition to the checks carried out by the External Auditor for the year end audit. The Chair of Governors has also carried out a check on the monthly reconciliation which is done prior to each meeting. The Head checks, then signs off the monthly reconciliations.

There have been no material control or other issues reported to date.

Review of effectiveness

As accounting officer, the Headteacher, Hannah Albery, has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the period in question the review has been informed by:

- The internal financial review by Duncan Toplis;
- The work of the external auditor, Forrester Boyd;
- The work of the Business Manager who has responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The Accounting Officer has been advised of the implications of the result of the review of the system of internal control by the Governing Body and there is an ongoing plan to address any weaknesses identified and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees (who act as Governors of Yarborough Academy and are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with the Academies Annual Accounts Direction published by the Education and Skills Funding Agency, United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and applicable law and regulations.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

1 Accounting policies

General information

The academy trust is a private company limited by guarantee and incorporated in the United Kingdom.

The address of its registered office is: Yarborough Academy Yarrow Road Grimsby DN34 4JU

These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Board on 14 December 2021.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2020 to 2021 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the company and have been rounded to the nearest pound.

Yarborough Academy meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

The financial statements cover the individual entity, Yarborough Academy.

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are spent on capital projects in line with the terms and conditions of the grant. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other trading activity income, including the proceeds from the sale of assets, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £2,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. The related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the Academy Trust's depreciation policy. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, per the table below.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Long term leasehold land:

The land is held on a 125 year lease with North East Lincolnshire Council. It was recognised as an asset on conversion and is being depreciated accordingly.

Financial Instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at transaction price less any provision for impairment. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at transaction price. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instrucments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Pension benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income/(expenditure) are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 24, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2021. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

General Annual Grant (GAG) income must be used for the normal running costs for the Academy, the academy trust was not subject to a limit on GAG carry-forward.

Pupil Premium Grant may be spent for the educational benefit of pupils registered at that school, or for the benefit of pupils registered at other schools; and on community facilities i.e. services whose provision furthers any charitable purpose for the benefit of pupils at the school or their families, or people who live or work in the locality in which the school is situated. The grant does not have to be completely spent by schools in the financial year.

Universal Infants Free School Meal funding is primarily to be used to provide children with a free school meal. However, any amounts not spent on this purpose can be used for any other purpose applicable to the objectives of the academy.

Devolved capital allocated directly by the DfE must be spent on capital purposes. Capital expenditure from other funds is made up of any fixed assets purchased during the year and the expense is the depreciation relating to these additions.

The donated assets income is the value of the school and other assets transferred from the local authority on conversion. The expenditure is the depreciation of the building and brought forward assets for the year ended 31 August 2021.

24 Pension and similar obligations

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by East Riding Pension Fund. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS 31 March 2019.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliment.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016 and in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

24 Pension and similar obligations (continued)

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. Assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £172,705 (2020: £164,357). A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2021 was £136,000 (2020 - £145,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £103,000 (2020 - £112,000) and employees' contributions totalled £33,000 (2020 - £33,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 27.3 per cent for employers and 5-7 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
