

Fantastic project-based learning

YARBOROUGH Academy introduced a Project Based Learning curriculum in September 2014.

The children learn through immersive experiences, with essential questions, clear opportunities to apply English and maths skills, and an authentic audience for the end exhibition.

from parents after visiting the class exhibitions this term. Children are engaged with their projects, able to clearly explain what the have been learning, and using their initiative to deepen understanding.

We are determined to continue with this way of learning in order to ensure Yarborough has high academic achievements at the heart of the community.

Reception class learnt about "What makes a special meal?"

The children had learnt all about different foods and a special banquet was held at the exhibition to parents.

In Year 2 children were investigating "What makes a superhero?"

They started out by looking at comics and cartoon representations and then went on to look at heroes in our community.

There was some amazing Pop Art in the style of Roy Lichtenstein on display in their exhibition.



Year 5 investigated "How do natural disasters affect the world?" They produced a book and sold them in Freshney Place, sharing the information with Christmas shoppers. This was so successful they managed to raise over £1,400 for Shelterbox – a charity that works with survivors of natural disasters. In addition they visited a natural disasters exhibit at the world famous Natural History Museum.



Year 4 learnt about what it was like to be a child in World War II. Following a trip to Eden Camp they produced some amazing work that was displayed to parents.

One parent said: "I am extremely pleased with my child's progress – academically and on a personal level. I feel like my child has blossomed."



Year 1 were learning about "What makes toys special?"

After a visit to a toy museum, where they got to design and make their own special toy, the children acted as guides around their exhibition for parents.



Year 3 learned about why water is important. They used the film Frozen as inspiration for music and poetry and also designed boats and tested their sea-worthiness at Hubbard's Hills, in Louth.
